CATALOG DESCRIPTION

This course provides an introduction to the study of film. Students will examine the formal properties of film through four basic categories: history, genre, visual/composition design, and production processes.

SPECIFIC LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Trace a brief history of film throughout the 20th and into the 21st century:
 - Define film as an art form
 - Illustrate how the history of film is related to the evolution of culture and society
 - Identify the evolution of film throughout historical periods by viewing films and leading and/or participating in class discussions
 - Apply knowledge by writing a paper exploring one historical period of film or compare/contrast several historical periods of film
- 2. Analyze and evaluate the aesthetic, structural and thematic aspects of film:
 - Define the concepts of aesthetic, structural, and thematic
 - Identify these components by viewing films and leading and/or participating in class discussions
 - Explain how these components are integrated and juxtaposed by writers and directors to create innovative and exciting film
 - Apply knowledge by giving an oral presentation compare/contrasting at least two directors' use of these components
- 3. Build a framework for understanding styles, genres, and directorial concepts in film:
 - Define the terms style and genre, and explain the similarities and differences of each
 - Identify genre by viewing films in different genres and leading and/or participating in class discussions
 - Identify how different styles are employed in directing and acting techniques by viewing films in different styles and leading and/or participating in class discussions
 - Explain how these components are integrated and juxtaposed by writers and directors to create innovative and exciting film
 - Apply knowledge by creating a film concept that applies various elements of genre and style
- 4. Enhance critical thinking and oral and written communication skills when analyzing film:
 - Organize, outline, and lead at least one class discussion on a topic explored in class
 - Actively participate in all class discussions
 - Apply knowledge learned in class to form solid, astute, and valid opinions and theories on films and topics discussed in class in both oral and written work
 - Be able to justify these opinions and theories with credible supporting material in both oral and written work
 - Demonstrate ability to apply observations and feedback of other students' work to your own work
- 5. Maintain creative concentration when working individually and within a team:
 - Illustrate how we can use film to present and communicate feelings and ideas
 - Illustrate how we can foster creative traits in ourselves by viewing and analyzing the creative art of film
 - Illustrate how we can develop skills in creative problem sensing and solving within a group
 - Apply all of the above when completing group presentations, group projects, individual papers, or leading class discussions
