- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of central research questions, theories, and methodologies used in the study of human development.
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of the main areas of development, emphasizing physical, cognitive, and social development and changes within these across the life span.
- 3. Develop skills to evaluate critically how development is influenced by contextual factors including social class, ethnicity, and family processes.
- 4. Develop the ability to identify, analyze, and synthesize developmental psychological concepts and apply them to explain everyday events.

SPECIFIC LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of central research questions, theories, and methodologies used in the study of human development.
 - a. Develop an understanding of major issues and debates in human development including: nature vs. nurture controversy; continuity vs. discontinuity of development
 - b. Evaluate the major theories and research methodologies used by developmental psychologists.
 - c. Identify Piaget's Cognitive Theory of Development: important processes (assimilation & accommodation) and stages of theory (know ages and important tasks of each stage).
 - d. Describe theories of moral development (Kohlberg's stages and Gilligan's typologies)
 - e. Identify Erikson's Psychosocial Stages of Development (understand the "crisis" and developmental period of each stage).
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of the main areas of development, emphasizing physical, cognitive, and social development and changes within these across the life span.
 - a. Evaluate life stages and developmental milestones throughout the life span.
 - b. Describe prenatal development, teratogens and issues of pregnancy, and the childbirth experience.
 - c. Identify different physical (e.g. reflexes and sensory abilities) and cognitive (e.g. object permanence) abilities in infancy.
 - d. Describe physical, cognitive, and social development during childhood and adolescence
 - e. Describe physical, social, and psychological issues in Early, Middle, and Late Adulthood (e.g. changes and transitions)
 - f. Evaluate aspects of death and dying; Kubler-Ross' 5 stages (meaning of each)
- 3. Develop skills to evaluate critically how development is influenced by contextual factors including social class, ethnicity, and family processes.
 - a. Evaluate infant attachment including: attachment styles, theories of attachment, cultural factors associated with attachment, etc.
 - b. Evaluate parenting: Parenting styles; Father's role in child rearing; Day-care issues
- 4. Develop the ability to identify, analyze, and synthesize developmental psychological concepts and apply them to explain everyday events.
 - a. Integrate and synthesize principles and theories of human development learned in class to "real world" experiences through portfolios, journals, essays, diaries, and other projects.
