SPECIFIC LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of central research questions, theories, and methodologies used in the study of social psychology.
 - a. Define social psychology and describe the history of and different subfields of social psychology.
 - b. Develop an understanding of the differences between social psychology, sociology and personality psychology.
 - c. Demonstrate an understanding of how social factors, individual factors, and the power of the situation influence behavior.
 - d. Describe how social psychologists conduct research.
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of the major concepts explored in social psychology.
 - a. Evaluate attribution theory including types of attributions, fundamental attribution error, self-serving attributions, etc.
 - b. Develop an understanding of the social psychological principles of self-fulfilling prophecies and actor/observer difference.
 - c. Evaluate self-awareness theory and self-perception theory.
 - d. Evaluate the social comparison theory and looking-glass self.
 - e. Explain cognitive dissonance and ways to reduce it.
 - f. Explain internal justification, external justification and counter-attitudinal advocacy.
 - g. Define cognitively based, behavioral based and affectively based attitudes.
 - h. Explain the central & peripheral routes to persuasion.
 - i. Differentiate between informational social influence & normative social influence.
 - j. Evaluate Milgram's study of obedience and how it relates to our understanding of obedience and compliance.
 - k. Explain deindividuation, social loafing and social facilitation.
- 3. Develop skills to evaluate critically social psychological concepts and the influence of contextual factors including social class, ethnicity, and family processes.
 - a. Evaluate self-knowledge and how we come to understand ourselves.
 - b. Differentiate between the independent view and the interdependent view of self.
 - c. Define prejudice, stereotypes and discrimination; differentiate between in-groups and out-groups; evaluate how prejudice can be reduced.
 - d. Explain attitudes, where they come from & how we can change attitudes.
 - e. Develop an understanding of conformity and evaluate why and when we conform.
 - f. Evaluate how sociocultural diversity influences behavior and cognition.
- 4. Develop the ability to identify, analyze, and synthesize social psychological concepts and apply them to explain everyday events.
 - a. Evaluate social cognition and social perception and their relation to how we think about the social world other people.
 - b. Integrate and synthesize principles and theories of human development learned in class to "real world" experiences through portfolios, journals, essays, diaries, and other projects.
