

SIGN-1120 - AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE II 3 CREDITS

SYLLABUS

CATALOG DESCRIPTION

American Sign Language II is a continuation course that builds on concepts and skills developed in American Sign Language I. Students gain further exposure to ASL structure and grammar, and Deaf Culture and the Deaf community. Emphasis is on increasing students' ability to comprehend other signers and express themselves with more elaboration when conversing or presenting in ASL.

SPECIFIC EXPECTED LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. Communicative strategies: Engage in conversation (i,e receptive sign language, communicate only with sign language, body language and facial expression) by providing and obtaining information in expressing feelings, emotions, present and past topics of shared interest in one's daily life, at home, school and the work place.
 - a) Be able to carry on a basic conversation telling about where you are from and how/why you are learning ASL.
 - b) Develop the ability to tell simple stories in ASL.
 - c) Make complaints and/or suggestions using a basic level of ASL.
- 2. Grammar Study: the basics structure of the language; compare ASL with English and other languages, thus develop an appreciation for basic grammatical concepts.
 - a) Demonstrate the ability to use, combine, and integrate grammatical structures into meaningful sentences.
 - b) ASL grammar structure and question markers.
 - c) Use facial expression and body language.
 - d) Use formal and informal language.
- 3. Intercultural awareness: Increase intercultural awareness and understanding of the Deaf Culture/Communities. The significance of ASL in the past, present and contributions to the American Deaf Culture. Develop critical thinking skills by making analytical comparisons and connections between beliefs and behaviors.
 - a. Know when to use the ASL language in a cultural concept and setting, as well as using acquired knowledge to interact appropriately.
 - b. Develop an understanding of Deaf culture, including such element as value system language.
 - c. Study exploration of the Deaf social and cultural aspects d) Discuss the culture of ASL.
