

Course Level Objectives


- 1. Integrate the knowledge of multifaceted, advanced patient care into the Dental Hygiene care plan.
- 2. Assess, evaluate, demonstrate a broad understanding of a complicated, comprehensive case presentation and be able to answer questions using critical thinking skills.
- 3. Understand root morphology in preparation for advanced instrumentation.
- 4. Discuss the role of advanced instrumentation in non-surgical periodontal treatment as it relates to technique, instrument selection, aims and expected outcomes.
- 5. Discuss the effects of aging and disability on the periodontium and explain the role of the dental hygienist in care of the patient with age related disabilities.
- 6. Explain the rationale for maintenance appointments and describe the criteria to consider in selecting appointment intervals.

- 7. List and describe local delivery agents a dental hygienist can utilize as supplemental care procedures following non-surgical periodontal therapy.
- 8. Assemble a nutritional analysis of the Case Documentation/ Presentation patient that integrates cultural preferences.
- 9. Integrate a nutritional analysis into comprehensive patient care, understand how nutrition relates to caries risk assessment. Recognize eating disorders as component of nutritional analysis.
- 10. Demonstrate the ability to assess nutritional needs as they relate to oral health care.
- 11. Understand rationale and timing of dental hygiene patient education. Collaborate with patient to identify and demonstrate preventive aid plans that are personalized and demonstrate cultural awareness.
- 12. Describe emergency situations and protocol in the clinical setting.
- 13. Identify the HIPAA regulations as they pertain to the dental setting.
- 14. Explain the role of the dental hygienist in the care of the patient with disabilities. Define and understand palliative care, evidence based dental hygiene interventions, and the hygienist's role as part of the palliative team.
- 15. Describe the etiology of dentin hypersensitivity and the process of differential diagnosis. Differentiate mechanisms of dentin exposure and apply appropriate treatment interventions.
- 16. Explain mechanisms of action of Fluoride in caries prevention. Explain the role of community water fluoridation. Incorporate F therapy into patient prevention plans.
- 17. Integrate the practice of dental hygiene into a case presentation that demonstrates the application of a more advanced level of dental hygiene knowledge, skills, and attitudes.
- 18. Demonstrate critical thinking and clinical reasoning skills while examining several case studies







Course Requirements

Students will do the following activities:

- 3-2-1 Clinic Discussion Board Online Reflection: This course will continue to develop the theoretical framework of dental hygiene. In order to connect the theoretical concepts to clinical practice, students will reflect on their learning outcomes/experiences from Clinic III. Students will be required to participate in a clinic discussion board on Canvas. Once a month the student will be expected to submit an original post. Use the "3-2-1 Criteria" (Provide 3 things you learned in clinic, 2 questions you still need to research, and 1 thing you will do differently in your future practice). The due dates will be provided on Canvas. The student will then be expected to respond to 1 other post.
- Case Documentation: Each student is expected to choose a clinic patient and document assessments and treatment outcomes in a format outlined in the Case Documentation handout available on Canvas. A nutritional analysis and presentation will be included. Each student will create a formal PPT to be presented to class. Presentations will be scheduled toward the end of the semester. Your patient should be confirmed by Sept 21 to ensure enough time to complete the patient.
- Interprofessional Education Project: Each student will participate in a project aimed at enhancing awareness of other professional groups; improving your knowledge and understanding of how to work on an interprofessional team; and

strengthening your communication and collaboration skills. Project due Thurs., Dec 3rd.

- More information on the project will be presented in class.
- Case Studies: Several clinical case studies will be explored and practiced to enhance clinical reasoning skills. Instruction will be provided in class.
- Exams: Periodic exams and a final comprehensive exam are scheduled throughout the semester. See Schedule on Canvas. Quizzes based on reading assignments may be given at the discretion of the instructor.

Other Classroom Policies and Expectations

Preparation: During this course it is expected that the student prepares for class. This includes reading or viewing the information prior to class. Students should be prepared to participate in active learning discussions in each class on the topic assigned for that day, as well as team-based learning activities.

Exams and quizzes: Exams are scheduled throughout the semester and there may be unannounced quizzes at the discretion of the instructor. If the student has adequately prepared for the class there should be little trouble passing these tests or completing course assignments.

Make-Up Policy: Students will not be allowed to make up quizzes (a zero will be given for each missed quiz). If a major examination is missed, it is the student's responsibility to make arrangements with the instructor and schedule a Make-Up Examination. The Make-Up Exam will be different from the one given to the other students and may be oral, written, or a combination of both.

Assignments: Assignments that are not received on time will receive a 10% reduction in grade.

7. Drop for Non-Attendance and/or Non-Participation

Class Attendance and Participation Expectation:

<u>Face-to-Face</u> -- Students are expected to attend and participate in class regularly. Any student missing more than 10% of consecutive class time, (For example, in a regular 15-week class that meets twice a week, this equates to the student missing 3 consecutive classes) without consultation with the instructor may be considered as having abandoned the course.

<u>On-line</u> -- Students are expected to participate regularly and submit all course assignments, based on the course guide definition. A student who does not submit any assignments during a consecutive 10% of the course (1.5 weeks of a 15-week semester) without consulting the instructor, may be considered as having abandoned the course. Logging in does not meet the attendance standard.

<u>Competency-Based Education Classes</u> -- Students are expected to have regular and substantive interactions with their instructor and to actively work on course content. A student who has not submitted coursework, nor had substantive interactions with the instructor over a consecutive 10% of the term, without the instructor's prior approval, will be considered to have abandoned the competency progression. Last date of attendance will be recorded as the last date that coursework was submitted or that the student met with the instructor. For on-line learners, logging in does not meet the attendance standard.

8. Failure to Meet Class Participation Expectation:

Students who fail to meet participation expectations will have their last date of attendance recorded. This date will be used to recalculate any financial aid received/veteran's benefits received, and the student may be required to repay the institution/government. If the student does not drop the course, an 'X' grade will be recorded. An 'X' grade impacts the grade point average the same as an 'F'.

9. Grading Policies

Incomplete: Incomplete Grade Assignment (Incomplete Grades Information)

The grade of I (Incomplete) is given for passing work that could not be completed during the semester because of circumstances beyond the student's control. Ordinarily, the assignment of an I is given by the course instructor at the time final grades are due

In no case is an I grade to be used to avoid assignment of D or F grades for marginal or failing work or to require a student to enroll in the class the next semester because work was not completed on time. Circumstances warranting the issuance of an I grade must be beyond the student's control and must be documented on the appropriate form prior to approval.

I grades can be removed only during the subsequent 16 weeks from the end of term, or within the time limit set by the instructor. Removal of an I is accomplished by completing the work in a manner acceptable to the instructor. Re-enrollment in the course under the repeat option does not remove the prior grade of I. Students should not re-enroll for the course. An I not made up within 16 weeks or within the time limit set by the instructor will change to an F grade thereafter and cannot be changed by work completion.
