

# RUSS-1120 RUSSIAN II 3 CREDITS

### **S**YLLABUS

### CATALOG DESCRIPTION

This is an entry level continuation course for students that have completed Elementary Russian I. The course will use a communicative approach to cover the fundamentals of basic vocabulary, grammar, conversation and culture. After the completion of the course, students will be able to perform in specific situations at the Novice-High level on the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages proficiency scale.

- 1. Communicate at an elementary level in the following contexts:
  - Using numbers and classroom expressions, using and expressing calendar dates and telephone number
  - Talking about one's family, home (apartment), neighborhood, hobbies, professions, sports, age, music, future
  - events, studies and being a student, cooking
  - Speaking on the telephone
  - Asking about and expressing location, nationality and place of origin, quantity and ownership, surprise, delight,
  - and dismay, the time and expressing A.M and P.M.
  - Giving and soliciting opinions, motion and destination, pieces of advice
  - Expressing the direct recipient of an action, possession, locations in, at, on, permission and prohibition, what one
  - wants, strong feelings and opinions, regret, absence in the past and future, thanks.
  - Describing ongoing actions, academic majors, needs and obligations, someone's abilities, round-trip or habitual
  - travel
  - Discussing likes and dislikes
  - Extending and accepting invitations
- 2. Handle and develop correct pronunciation of vowels and consonants spoken in the Russian language.
- 3. Read texts on the bases of Cyrillic alphabet and translate texts with a dictionary.
- 4. Write (print and cursive) in Cyrillic letters, words, simple sentences, personal letters
- 5. Compare the target language with English or other native languages, relating the structure of different languages and, thus, developing an appreciation for some basic linguistic issues.
- 6. Demonstrate the ability to use, combine, and integrate the following grammatical structures into meaningful sentences:
  - Word order in sentences, word order in questions and answers
  - Grammatical gender, plurals of masculine, feminine, and neuter nouns
  - Verb conjugation, The Present Tense, The Past Tense, and The Future Tense, verbs of motion and destinations, the
  - verb есть in the Present and Past Tenses, stem-changing verbs
  - Parts of Speech: Nouns, Adjectives, Adverbs, Pronouns
  - Cases of nouns, pronouns, and adjectives
  - Subordinate clauses with кто, что, где, который, почему, как
  - Using noun-noun phrases, negatives
  - Direct and Indirect Speech
  - Double negatives
  - Permission and prohibition можно/нельзя
  - Reflexive Verbs: present and past tense forms
- 7. Analyze and compare the following issues:
  - Formal vs. informal registers in the target language
  - Similarities, differences, and connections in life styles, beliefs, behaviors, and artifacts (i.e. music, planning, films, literature, etc.) in different linguistic communities
  - Demonstrate intercultural understanding of basic facts about the history, geography, and culture of Russia
- 8. Connect Russian and another discipline area of their interest (e.g. history, literature, geography, sociology, political science, statistics, etc.).
