Course Requirements

Students will do the following activities:

Short assignments/homework: These are primarily sentence pattern recognition and diagramming assignments. They will occur regularly as we move through the text. At the end of each chapter, for example, there is a Sentences for Practice section.

Quizzes: There will be several chapter quizzes throughout the semester.

Learning Journal: I encourage you to use a learning journal to record what you are learning, what questions you have, and what confuses you about learning grammar. Though I won't collect them every week, it will be helpful when you write your midterm and final self-reflections to have past learning journals to refer to. Presentations: Individuals will be assigned to teach short lessons on a variety of grammatical topics or present on a grammar point that is relevant to writing.

Exams: There will be a mid-term and final exam, covering the basic grammatical elements covered in class, including terms, theories, and sentence diagramming.

Please make every effort to attend class. If you miss more than 15% of the class (approximately 4 absences), your grade may drop one letter. If you miss too many classes, you will have a hard time staying caught up with the class.

Other Classroom Policies and Expectations

1. Since many assignments will be handwritten (diagrams, for example), you may not be able to submit them easily on Canvas or via email. Physically turning them in to me will be easiest. Please make every effort to turn the homework in on time. We may be able to submit work through jpgs on Canvas depending on our class.

2. You will be required to write 10 journals during our 16 weeks together. You can decide what weeks to submit the journals on Canvas. These journals should be approximately one page, typed, double-spaced and should cover what you knew about the topic before, what you learned from the chapter or exercises and what remains a question for you. The due dates will be set each week but you won't be penalized the weeks you do not submit. I will only accept one journal per week (not 10 the last week).

Canvas Participation and Expectations

This class is face-to-face so our work on Canvas will be minimal; however, we will use it for communication and grades.

Instructor Response Time

Generally, I can return your homework by the next class period, but on occasion it may take a little longer to get work graded and returned. If you submit work late, it goes to the bottom of the workload and may take even up to a week before I can get to it.

As for emails, I always return messages within 24 hours and very often by the end of that same day during the week though my response may be a little slower on the weekend.

Course Time Commitment

This is not a typical English class so you won't have to write formal papers. But you should plan to spend 1-2 hours for each hour we have in class. Most of the homework will be in diagramming sentences and writing learning journals.

7. Drop for Non-Attendance and/or Non-Participation

Class Attendance and Participation Expectation:

<u>Face-to-Face</u> -- Students are expected to attend and participate in class regularly. Any student missing more than 10% of consecutive class time, (For example, in a regular 15-week class that meets twice a week, this equates to the student missing 3 consecutive classes) without consultation with the instructor may be considered as having abandoned the course.

<u>On-line</u> -- Students are expected to participate regularly and submit all course assignments, based on the course guide definition. A student who does not submit any assignments during a consecutive 10% of the course (1.5 weeks of a 15-week semester) without consulting the instructor, may be considered as having abandoned the course. Logging in does not meet the attendance standard.

<u>Competency-Based Education Classes</u> -- Students are expected to have regular and substantive interactions with their instructor and to actively work on course content. A student who has not submitted coursework, nor had substantive interactions with the instructor over a consecutive 10% of the term, without the instructor's prior approval, will be considered to have abandoned the competency progression. Last date of attendance will be recorded as the last date that coursework was submitted or that the student met with the instructor. For on-line learners, logging in does not meet the attendance standard.

8. Failure to Meet Class Participation Expectation:

Students who fail to meet participation expectations will have their last date of attendance recorded. This date will be used to recalculate any financial aid received/veteran's benefits received, and the student may be required to repay the institution/government. If the student does not drop the course, an 'X' grade will be recorded. An 'X' grade impacts the grade point average the same as an 'F'.

9. Grading Policies

Incomplete: Incomplete Grade Assignment (Incomplete Grades Information)

The grade of I (Incomplete) is given for passing work that could not be completed during the semester because of circumstances beyond the student's control. Ordinarily, the assignment of an I is given by the course instructor at the time final grades are due.

In no case is an I grade to be used to avoid assignment of D or F grades for marginal or failing work or to require a student to enroll in the class the next semester because work was not completed on time. Circumstances warranting the issuance of an I grade must be beyond the student's control and must be documented on the appropriate form prior to approval.

I grades can be removed only during the subsequent 16 weeks from the end of term, or within the time limit set by the instructor. Removal of an I is accomplished by completing the work in a manner acceptable to the instructor. Re-enrollment in the course under the repeat option does not remove the prior grade of I. Students should not re-enroll for the course. An I not made up within 16 weeks or within the time limit set by the instructor will change to an F grade thereafter and cannot be changed by work completion.
