
### Course Level Objectives

Upon successful completion of the course, the student will be able to describe and apply knowledge of the following topics for canine and feline patients:

- Clinical Nursing Skills: Provide proper restraint and handing of patients; Apply muzzles and E-collars; Obtain patient histories and perform physical exams; Provide basic husbandry care; Administer medications using various routes and techniques.
- Organization of the body cells and tissues.
- List and identify the mechanisms of disease and explain proper sanitation.
- Describe Oncology concepts; List and identify the signs of pain in animals.
- Diseases: Identify anatomical structures; Explain the function of the components; Describe and identify select diseases; Describe procedures used to diagnose disorders; and List the common medical treatments involving disorders of the following systems:
  - Eye, Integumentary, Ear, Musculoskeletal, and Endocrine.
- Develop reports on special topics.

### Course Time Commitment

In addition to the coursework assignments, students will also be required to be working in a veterinary facility and performing clinical tasks for the Course Task Checklists (CTCs). The estimated clinical hours needed for the CTCs for the average student is 5 hours per week. OCCI site factors, such as hospital size, hospital patient flow, number of preceptors, and conditions in the

OCCI site, may impact the total number of clinical hours needed. These hours are meant to aid the student in planning their course load.

### Canvas Participation and Expectations
