Course Learning Outcomes

- 1. To read and think critically about each text, analyzing literary elements and interpreting meaning.
 - a. Read representative texts by Native American authors from various cultural and historical backgrounds, identifying literary elements and common themes
 - b. Make connections, draw conclusions, and interact with ideas presented in reading selections and other forms of media
 - c. Understand some of the historical and cultural forces that have influenced the Native American literature being studied in the course
 - d. Gain an appreciation for the many voices that make up Native American writing
- 2. To generate reflective and academic writing about literature using primary and secondary sources.
 - a. Generate academic papers focusing on literary texts and using MLA documentation
 - b. Generate essays with significant analysis and treatment of topics or issues
 - Generate essays that make connections and draw conclusions among multiple texts which identify cultural and historical forces that have influenced those texts

- d. Generate essays that demonstrate understanding of the diversity of Native American authors and literature
- e. Understand and apply standard conventions of writing (spelling, grammar, punctuation, usage, diction, and syntax)
