CATALOG DESCRIPTION

The purpose of this second level beginning class is to further develop listening, speaking, reading writing skills to communicate at a basic level.

The course will use a communicative approach to reinforce and expand the fundamentals of basic vocabulary, grammar, conversation and culture. Lecture and lab components.

Familiarize students with the culture of the German speaking countries.

SPECIFIC EXPECTED LEARNING OUTCOMES

1. Communicative strategies

Upon completion of the course, you will be able to increase your understanding of the German language; develop your communicative skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing; and apply them to a wider variety of real-life situations in the following contexts:

- a) Talk about breakfast, lunch, and dinner, and order food at a restaurant
- b) Describe pastimes, interests, leisure, and sports activities
- c) Talk about how you celebrate special occasions and holidays
- d) Describe your house, items in your house, neighborhood, and household chores
- e) Discuss computers and the Internet
- f) Talk about your childhood and your youth

2. Grammar

Upon completion of the course, you will be able to better compare the target language with English, and, thus, enhance your appreciation for basic linguistic concepts. You will:

- a) Demonstrate the ability to use, combine, and integrate the following grammatical structures into meaningful sentences:
 - Articles, nouns, prepositions, and adjectives
 - Present tense of regular, irregular, and stem-changing verbs
 - Direct object
 - Accusative case and interrogative pronoun wen
 - Adjective endings in the accusative case
 - Verbs with stem vowels changes
 - Konnen, mussen and wollen (modal verbs)
 - Separable German prefix verbs
 - Preterit tense to express what you did in the past
 - Imperfect verb forms to express what you used to do in the past
- b) Analyze and compare cognates, word order, and syntactical functions, morphological components such as prefixes, suffixes, and verb conjugations. c) Use formal and informal language.

3. Intercultural awareness

- a) Increase intercultural awareness and understanding by exploring the diversity of the Spanish-speaking world and develop critical thinking skills by making analytical cross-cultural comparisons.
- b) Familiarize students with art and some artists of Hispanic countries.
- c) Use formal and informal language in the appropriate situation.
