- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of the major theories, terminology, principles, processes, and research methods in the field of sociology.
- 2. Develop field related study and research skills that enhance the ability to gather and synthesize information from multiple sources.
 - 3. Apply important sociological tools and concepts to experiences encountered outside of the classroom.

4. Develop a sense of sociological perspective that gives evidence of an expanded experience of social responsibility.

Course Learning Outcomes (Specific)

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of the major theories, terminology, principles, processes, and research methods in the field of sociology.
 - a. Describe the historical events, theoretical concepts, and contributing figures which have influenced modern sociological perspectives (LEARN/THINK).
 - b. Develop an understanding of the interrelationship between culture and society (LEARN, THINK).
 - c. Explore the complex influences which socialize individuals into the larger society (LEARN, THINK).
 - d. Apply the concepts listed above to specific areas of sociology, *such as* gender, race, ethnicity, deviance, politics, and/or social and global stratification (THINK).
- 2. Develop field related study and research skills that enhance the ability to gather and synthesize information from multiple sources.
 - a. Explore and evaluate an experience outside of one's own subcultural background through observation (THINK, ACT) and/or;
 - b. Explore and evaluate an aspect of one's own subcultural background through applying outside resources and analysis as well as personally practicing the sociological perspective (THINK, ACT).
 - c. Use appropriate technologies for researching, writing up, and presenting what they have learned (INTEGRATE, COMMUNICATE).
- 3. Apply important sociological tools and concepts to experiences encountered outside of the classroom.
 - a. Be able to actively engage others in discussion that includes sociological concepts that are being studied through the course (LEARN, THINK, COMMUNICATE).
 - b. Demonstrate understanding of sociological concepts by exploring and integrating an experience *outside* of one's own subcultural background through observation and analysis (THINK, ACT, COMMUNICATE) *and/or*;
 - c. Demonstrate understanding of sociological concepts by exploring and integrating personal life experiences and/or subcultural background through observation, research, and individual practice of the sociological perspective *within* one's own cultural/subcultural heritage (THINK, ACT, COMMUNICATE).
- 4. Develop a sense of sociological perspective that gives evidence of an expanded experience of social responsibility.
 - a. Participate in discussions and thought-provoking and experientially-focused class and outside activities aimed at expanding one's sociological perspective and awareness of social responsibility (THINK, COMMUNICATE, ACT) and/or;
 - b. Participate in an area of service learning or some activity/experience that enhances one's face-to-face connection between sociology and sociological concepts and real life experience and use appropriate technologies for writing up and presenting what they have learned (LEARN, THINK, ACT, INTEGRATE, COMMUNICATE).
