COURSE # Fire 273 COURSE TITLE: Advanced Swift Water Rescue Technician # OF CREDITS: 2

CATALOG DESCRIPTION

This course integrates techniques learned in FIRE 272 Swift Water Rescue Technician, taking the students beyond the emphasis on self-rescue to concentrate on victim rescue. Students are exposed to more complex water rescue situations including a mock night river rescue scenario. This course involves classroom and extensive hands-on activities.

- 1. Develop a site survey for an existing water hazard
- 2. Select water rescue personal protective equipment
- 3. Swim a designated water course
- 4. Define search parameters for a water rescue incident
- 5. Develop an action plan for a shore-based rescue of a single, water-bound victim,
- 6. Deploy a water rescue rope to a water-bound victim

- 7. Deploy watercraft
- 8. Negotiate a designated water course in a watercraft
- 9. As a member of a team, use a parbuckling technique to extricate an incapacitated water-bound victim from the water to a watercraft
- 10. Extricate an incapacitated water-bound victim from the water to the shore as a member of a team
- 11. Perform a swimming surface water rescue
- 12. Direct a team in the operation of a highline system as a member of a team
- 13. Define applications for helicopter aquatic rescue operations within the area of responsibility for the AHJ

ATTENDANCE

- 1. Students are expected to attend all class sessions. Instructors will take attendance.
- 2. Absences do not relieve students of the responsibility for missed assignments.
- 3. <u>Students must take the initiative</u> in arranging with their instructors to make up missed work if applicable.
