5. Describe issues that influence incident completely and the tools available to analyze complexity.
6. Describe to process for transfer of command.
7. Describe the primary guidelines and responsibilities of the Command and General Staff positions.
8. List major steps in the planning process.
9. Describe the purpose and responsibilities of Agency Representatives or technical specialists, reporting relationships, and how they can be used effectively within the incident organization.
10. Define advantages of Unified Command and the kinds of situations that may call for a Unified Command organization.
11. Describe how Unified Command functions on a multijurisdictional or multiagency incident.
