- d. Evaluate the effects of the aging process on sexuality (e.g. male and female climacteric).
- e. Demonstrate an understanding of the negative consequences of sexuality (e.g. STDs) and ways these can be prevented.

- a. Evaluate the procedures, purposes, and cultural perceptions of female genital mutilation.
- b. Describe cultural perceptions of acceptable sexual behavior, normality, and abnormality.

- b. Describe the social obstacles to sexual development in same-gender orientation individuals.

- e. Demonstrate an understanding of how coercion can be involved in sexual behaviors.
